SUBJECT: S-3 Marrative Report for Operational Mission 3 September, 1943.

- TO : Commanding Officer, 95th Bombardment Group (H), APO 634.
- 1. The 95th Bombardment Group (H) was alerted for an operational mission 1730, 2 September, 1943 with a bomb loading of 12 x 500 pound bombs with 1/10 second nose and 1/100 second tail fuse.
- 2. Field Order number 51 was received at 2230, 2 September, 1943. Twenty-one aircraft were called for and twenty-two were set up, one to turn back at the point of leaving the English Coast if no abortions occured. The 95th Group was set up as the high group in the 402nd Combat Wing which was the Third Air Task Force. The 188th Group was the lead group and the 390th Group was the low group but failed to rendezvous. The lead group failed to bomb the primary target: The 95th bombed the primary target with good results and then followed in close support to the 188th Group, as they made bombing runs over the secondary target. There were two abortions in our group leaving twenty of our aircraft, all of which returned.
- 3. Flak encountered oner the target area was quite intense, but inaccurate. About 50 single engined fighters were encountered makinghead on, side and tail attacks. 10 twin engined fighters, made one pass, head on, at the lead group. Fighter escort by P-47's on the route in was good. On the return we failed to rendezvous with friendly fighters.

SUBJECT: Navigation Report for the Mission of 3 September 1943.

TO : Commanding Officer, 95th Bombardment Croup (H), APO 634.

- 1. The Ninety Fifth Bombardment Group (H) flow as high group in the Four Hundred Second Combat Wing.
- 2. The rendezvous caused some difficulty, and the Ninety Fifth Bombardment Group (H) intercepted the Hundreth Bombardment Group (H) on the briefed line between Splasher # 7 and Luton. Both groups crossed the coast on schedule at the zero hour. The Ninety Fifth Bombardment Group (H) bombed the primary target, and after that, followed in support to the Hundreth Bombardment Group (H) as they made runs over the secondary target.
- 3. Two "Gee" boxes were in operation both of which performed well over enemy territory, and over the target area, with no jamaing and only slight fading. One additional box failed to operate in flight.

SUBJECT: Bombing Report on the Mission of 3 September 1943.

- TO : Commanding Officer, 95th Bombardment Group (R), APO 634.
 - 1. Complete narrative of mission of the 3 September 1943.
 - a. ABC attachment and the C^1 were used as aids to the bombardier. Preset data derived from metro data was accurate.
 - b. No evasive action was employed.
 - c. The bomb bay doors were opened just before the lead bombardier began his run.
 - d. Bombing run was excellent and the target was easily recognized by the bombardier due to favorable weather conditions.
 - e. The flak during bombing run was heavy but ineffective. Fighter attacks on the run were inneffective.
 - f. Weather conditions at the target were good. The target was picked up approximately 12 miles away due to good visibility.
 - g. No unusual fighter attacks were reported. The usual single head on attacks was reported.
 - h. Visual results of the bombing were reported as fair.
 - i. There are no suggestions as to tactical changes in bombing technique on any particular target or on all targets.

SUBJECT: S-2 Report.

TO : Commanding Officer, 95th Bomb Group (H).

1. 22 A/C took off beginning at 0550 to attack the Renault plant on the west bank of the Seine in Paris.
Two A/C returned early:

#271 0720 52°15'N - 01°45'E Live bomb in inside rack.

#266 0745 52°30'N - 01°30'E #2 engine overheating.

Fighter excert by P-47's from French coast nearly to IP was most effective. Enemy attacks caused us no loss. Friendly fighters were not met upon route back. Flak at target. believed less than on mission to Le Bourget on 14-7-43 by crews who flew both missions. Lead group failed to bomb primary. A blown out fuse delayed slightly bomb release by our lead ship despite which all our A/C made good pattern on target. Lead group made 360° turn over secondary target (Beaumont-Le Roger) bombing both that A/D and Evereux A/D. Flak on return was chiefly directed at lead group. Low group failed to rendezvous with Combat Wing. All our A/C returned. Two crew members suffered gunshot woulds neither of which are believed to be serious.

1. 22 A/C took off to attack Renault Plant on the west bank of the Seine in Paris. 2A/C returned early. Enemy attacks caused us no loss. Lead squadron failed to bomb primary. A blown-out fuse slightly delayed bomb release by our lead ship despite which all other A/C made good pattern on target. Lead squadron made 360° turn over secondary target (Beaumont-Le-Roger) bombing both athat airdrome and Evreux airdrome. E/A claims 9-0-1.

VIII BC Narrative: The 4th Wing dispatched 65 A/C to attack Meulen-Les-Mureaux. The tar get was attacked with fair results. 56 attacked and 9 aborted.

168 A/C dispatched to Romilly-Sur-Seine, 140 attacked, 28 aborted and 4 were lost. E/A claims 11-1-10.
