SUBJECT: Report of Operations Officer, Frantic Mission of 3 July 1944.

- TO : Commanding Officer, 95th Bomb Group (H), APO 559.
- 1. GENERAL NAMERATIVE: The 95th group flying as low group of 13th combat wing took off at 0830 0850 hours. The lead and high squadrons of the group were furnished by the 95th group, the low squadron was furnished by the 100th group and two airbourne spares were furnished by the 45th wing. By 0915 the group had assembled over the base at 2,000.

The first control point was made on time and the combat wing was assembled as planned with the 100th group leading and the 390th group flying as high group. The Italian coast was crossed on the route out at 0955 and the climb to bombing altitude was started at this time, (21,000' for the 95th group). The enemy coast was crossed on the route in at 1030 and the briefed route was followed to the I.P. Bombing altitude was reached at 1146.

Bombs were away at 1214 hours. The rally was effected as planned and the briefed route was followed on the return route. The enemy coast was crossed at 1340 hours and the group arrived back at the base at 1435. The landing was made at 1450 - 1510 hours.

2. AIRCRAFT NOT ATTACKING: 18 aircraft, including 1 PFF left the base in the formation shown in attached diagram "A". A/C # 1887 left the formation over Italy and is not credited with a sortie. The remaining 17 A/C attacked the primary and are credited with sorties. The formation over the target is shown in attached diagram "B".

Of the 17 ships credited with sorties 10 are from the 95th group, 5 from the 100th group and 2 from the 45th wing.

3. LOST AIRCRAFT: None.
