95 A Group

1. GENERAL NARRATIVE: The 95 A group, flying as lead group in the 13 B combat wing, took off at 0435 - 0450 hours. By 0550 the group had assembled over the base at 12,000. Before leaving the area of the base the 95 B group flying as high group and the 100 B group flying as low group joined the formation, making a premature wing rendezvous. All control points over England were made good within one minute and the English coast was departed at 0637 hours.

At 0715 the climb to bombing altitude was started. Bombing altitude of 20,000 was reached at 0800 hours. The turn at the I.P. was made at 0819. The bombing run was made using PFF equipment. Bombs were away at 0825. The rally point was made good. The high group had fallen behind during the bombing run and did not rejoin the wing until 0850 hours.

After the rally point a let down to 15,000 was made. At 0915 the let down to minimum altitude was started.

Just before the English coast was reached on the return route three 360° turns were made in order to let down through a break in the overcast. The English coast was crossed at 1031 and the base was reached at 1040. The group landed at 1100 - 1115 hours.

- 2. AIRCRAFT NOT ATTACKING: Twenty aircraft, including one PFF and one unused spare, left the base in the formation shown in attached diagram "la". A/C # 7879 returned as an unused spare. The remaining 19 aircraft bombed the primary and are credited with sorties. The formation over the target is shown in attached diagram "2A".
 - 3. LOST AIRCRAFT: None.

95 B Group

1. GENERAL NARRATIVE: The 95 B group, flying as high group in the 13 B combat wing, took off at 0415-0430 hours and assembled over the base at 14,000. Before leaving the base the

group joined 95 A which was leading the wing. Since the mission was flown in company with that group, reference is made to the General Narrative of the 95 A group.

- 2. AIRCRAFT NOT ATTACKING: Twenty aircraft, including 1 PFF and one spare left the base in the formation shown in the attached diagram "lB". A/C 1999 returned as an unused spare. A/C 7801 did not bomb due to the fuze in # 3 engine nacelle being blown. A/C 2427 did not release 5 bombs due to rack failure. Nineteen ships went over the target and are credited with sorties. The formation over the target is shown in attached diagram "2B".
 - 3. LOST AIRCRAFT: None.

TO : Commanding Officer, 95th Bombardment Group (H), A.A.F.

- 1. Ninety Fifth "A" Group flew as lead of the 13th "B" Combat Wing. We formed the group at 0550 hours ever the base and picked up the high group over the base at 12000. At 0608 hours we were at the Naze and formed the wing at this time. We were unable to make control points BU# 22, BU# 12 and BU# 9 on time due to poor metro data. We followed the general course and left the English coast at Great Yarmouth at 0637 hours.
- 2. We started our climb at 0715 hours, 5330N 0348E to 18000'. At 0800 hours we were at 18000' at 5415N 0718E. Our I.P. was reached at 0819 hours, 5420N 0837E on course. We turned north of I.P. about 12 miles to lengthen the bombing run.
- 3. Bombs were away at 0825 hours on a true heading of 1240. The bombing run was made with the aid of the P.F.F. Aircraft and its equipment. We turned at the Rally Point to a true course of 3120 at 0829 hours reaching the coast at 0840 hours at 5428N 0837E where we started to let down to 15000°.
- 4. At 1008 hours we were 20 miles off the coast at Great Yarmouth and we flew three 360° turns letting doen to 1000' to get under the clouds. We reached Great Yarmouth at 1031 hours. We were over the base at 1040 hours at 1000'.

- l. The Ninety Fifth "B" Group flew as high group in the 13th "B" Combat Wing. We were airborne at 0415 hours. The Group was formed over the base at 14000' at 0550 hours. The sing was formed at The Naze at 0608 hours at 14000'. We were unable to make control points BU# 22, BU# 12, BU# 9 on time due to poor metro data. We followed the general course and left the English coast at Great Yarmouth at 0637 hours at 14000'.
- 2. We started our climb at 0715 hours, 5330N 0348E to 19000'. At 0800 hours we were at 19000' at 5415N 0718E. Our I.P. was reached at 0819 hours, 5424N 0815E on course. We made a P.F.F. rum on the primary target. The lead and lew groups identified a differen't mickey return for the target, and we became separated on the bombing run.
- 3. We came out on the briefed course crossing the Enemy coast at 0835 hours at 5425N 0850E and formed again with the lead and low group at 5422N 0733E at 0851 hours. We followed the briefed course back to Great Yarmouth.
- 4. At 1008 hours we were 20 miles off the coast at Great Yarmouth and we flew three 360° turns letting down to 1000°. We reached Great Yarmouth at 1027 hours and proceeded back to the base as a single group reaching the base at 1040 hours at 1000°.

- 1. Bombing Approach and Run The C-2, the E-6-B were used for the computation of altitude and air speeds. P.F.F. bombing was used as there was a 10/10ths cloud coverage at the target. The prescribed I.P. was used with the direction from the mickey operator. At the I.P. the bomb bay doors were opened. The mickey operator brought the plane in on the bomb run and the bombing was completed with the bombsight with directions from the mickey operator. No observations of the results were made because of cloud coverage.
- 2. Disposition of Bombs 19 A/C were dispatched from the 95th "B" Group. 18 A/C were over the primary target and dropped 165 x 500# G.P. AN-M64 bombs. A/C #7801 returned 10 x 500# G.P. AN-M64 bombs because of the fuses being burned out was unable to release bombs. A/C #2427 returned 5 x 500# G.P. AN-M64 bombs because of mechanical failure. - 5. Micky Operators believe primary target was hit. A/C 7801 had a malfunction in bomb racks and bombs wouldn't release-bombs returned. A/C 2427 had 5 bombs hang up-returned. All A/C returned to this base and landed by 1115 hours.
